Teacher's Notes On Slavery In New France

Information on this topic is difficult to find. Here are a few facts on slavery in New France.

Mattieu da Costa:

He was a guide and a translator with one of the expeditions led by Sieur des Monts. The expedition established a colony at Port Royal in 1605.

Olivier LeJeune:

Olivier was captured from Madagascar, a French colony off the east coast of Africa. He arrived in 1628 and was sold as a slave to one of the colonists. His surname was received from Father Paul LeJeune, who baptized him. Until his death in 1654, he worked as a domestic servant.

Marie Joseph Angelique:

She was born in Africa and lived in Ville Marie (Montréal). She was accused of burning her master's house and was hanged for the crime.

In 1689 Louis XIV, King of France granted permission for settlers to buy and own slaves brought from Africa.

In 1760, it was reported that there were over 1 000 black slaves, men, women and children in New France. The population of the whole colony at this time was about 64 000.
