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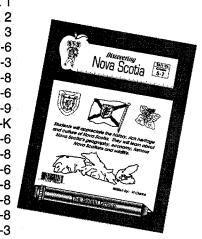

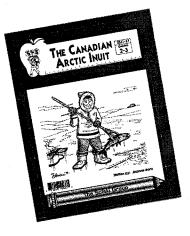

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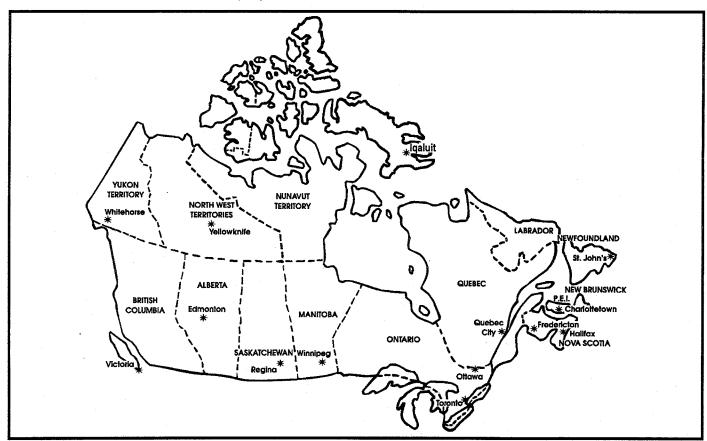
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Canada is the second largest country in the world having a land area of about 9 976 185 km² (3 851 809 sq. miles). There are over 25 million Canadians.

Canada is an independent country. It is part of the British Commonwealth and the British Queen is the Head of State. The Canadian nation is made up of ten provinces and three territories. In 1999, a new territory called Nunavut was created. It is part of the Northwest Territories. Each province has its own provincial government and controls many of its own affairs such as highways and education. Québec, Ontario, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick were the first provinces to join a single Government of Canada in 1867. Within four years, Manitoba and British Columbia also joined and the new Canada stretched from sea to sea. By 1905, Prince Edward Island, Saskatchewan and Alberta were added. In 1949, Newfoundland became the tenth and last province to join the Canadian Confederation. The three territories of Canada are The Yukon Territory, The Northwest Territories and Nunavut. They are largely uninhabited and remain Canada's last true areas of wilderness.

The map which follows shows Canada's ten provinces and three territories, along with their capital cities. The largest province is Québec which covers 1 667 926 km² (643 986 sq. miles). The smallest is Prince Edward Island covering 5 656 km² (2 184 sq. miles). About one third of Canada's population lives in Ontario.

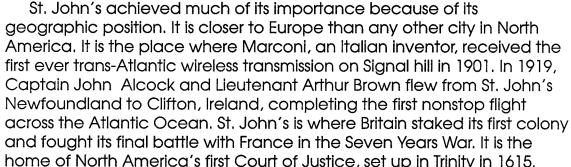


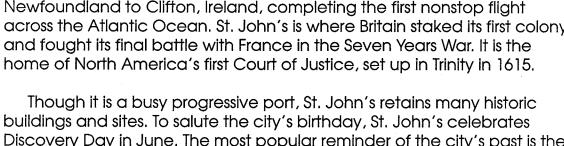




Capital of Newfoundland and Labrador

Discovery Day in June. The most popular reminder of the city's past is the
St. John's Regatta held in August. Dating from at least 1826, it is
considered one of the oldest organized sporting events in North
America. The Regatta takes place on a lake called Quidi Vidi.

St. John's became the capital of Newfoundland when it became a province in 1949. Today it has a population of about 95 800. John Cabot, the explorer was probably the first European to visit the area in 1497. He likely named it for St. John the Baptist since he arrived on his feast day. Many explorers and fishermen were drawn here in the 1500's because of the perfectly sheltered harbour and rich fishing waters. St. John's covers 83 sq. km (30 sq. miles) on the Avalon Peninsula at the southern end of the island of Newfoundland.





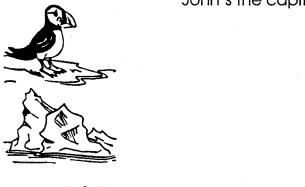






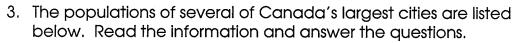

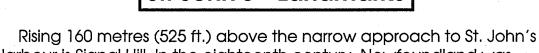












Harbour is Signal Hill. In the eighteenth century, Newfoundland was coveted by both England and France for its rich fishery. Because of its strategic location, the area saw many battles between the English and the French for control of Newfoundland and its fisheries. The British defeated the French in 1762 in the last battle between the two countries in North America. Because of its height and position at the mouth of the harbour, the site was also an important communications post. Signal Hill was known in the 18th century as the Lookout, and there residents would watch for flags hoisted on incoming ships and inform harbour pilots and customs officials. In 1901, Marconi received the first wireless signal there. A summer tradition since it was first performed as a centennial celebration in 1967, the Signal Hill Tattoo re-enacts militray exercises performed by the Royal Newfoundland Companies garrisoned at Signal Hill.
