# **Teacher Information**

#### **British Columbia**

### General

British Columbia joined confederation on July 20, 1871. Its capital is Victoria, although Vancouver is the province's largest city. The provincial flower is the pacific dogwood. The provincial bird is the steller's jay. The population of British Columbia is 3 244 100 (1991); the area is 948 598 square kilometres, which is 9.5% of Canada, making it Canada's third largest province.

#### Location

British Columbia is the western most province in Canada. It borders the Pacific Ocean, Alberta, the United States (Washington, Idaho, Montana, Alaska) and the Territories.

#### **Geography**

It is a magnificent province with a variety of interesting geographical features, including the Rocky Mountains, grasslands, vast forests, ranches, and beaches. This geographically diverse province has a wide range of climatic conditions.

### **History**

British Columbia was the last province to be settled by the Europeans. A British Captain, James Cook, landed on the western shores of Vancouver in 1778. Other explorers soon followed, including George Vancouver, Alexander Mackenzie, David Thompson and Simon Fraser. British and American settlers arrived next. A much larger influx of people arrived when gold was discovered in the mid 1800's along the Fraser River.



### Industry

Despite the mountainous terrain, British Columbia still has some important farming areas, especially along the Fraser Delta. Fruit, milk and cattle ranching are the main products from these. Although, only about 3% of British Columbia has suitable agricultural land, more than 5% of Canada's total agricultural output is from this province.

Manufacturing in British Columbia is dominated by the forest industry. The huge amount of forested areas with giant red cedars and Douglas firs produce lumber, pulp, paper and plywood for all of Canada as well as much of the United States and other parts of the world. 63% of Canada's lumber and most of its plywood is from British Columbia. Other important industries are fish-processing, mineral refineries, petroleum and tourism.

### **People**

British Columbia has the third largest population among the provinces in Canada. Presently, about half of the more than 3 million people living there are of British descent. About seven percent of the population are of Asian descent. Vancouver has the largest Chinese community in Canada - and it is growing. About 85 000 Native Americans live on reserves scattered about the province.
