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Objectives

- 1. To provide students with the opportunity to study the province of Manitoba.
- 2. To familiarize students with the location of Manitoba in Canada, North America and the World.
- 3. To provide students with the opportunity to locate towns, cities and bodies of water found in Manitoba through the use of different types of maps.
- 4. To make students aware of the importance of Manitoba and its relationship to the rest of the world.
- 5. To acquaint students with famous tourist attractions found in Manitoba and their locations.
- 6. To introduce famous people who lived or live in Manitoba.

Teacher Input Suggestions

Introduction:

The province of Manitoba can be introduced in any of the following ways.

- a) Use a good film, filmstrip or video about Manitoba to arouse student interest and curiosity.
- b) Collect pictures of famous places found in Manitoba. Use the pictures found in calendars, magazines, travel posters and large inexpensive pictures books (used for coffee tables). Cut out the pictures, mount them on a sturdy backing and laminate.

Display the pictures of the famous places found in Manitoba on a bulletin board or on the chalkboard. Make up name cards for the various places. The students will use the name cards to match to the pictures. Riddles could also be used in the same manner.

- c) Establish a centre for reference books about Manitoba. Above the centre hang a sign bearing the words "Manitoba The Keystone province". On a chart list simple questions for the students to find the answers.
- d) At a Mapping Centre place various types of road maps of Manitoba for the students to explore and peruse.

Brainstorming:

Brainsform with your class for information that they know about Manitoba. Record the information on a chart, then list questions that they have about the province on another chart. Throughout the unit encourage the students to find answers to their questions.

Mapping:

Use a map or globe to locate Manitoba to show its relationship in Canada, to the other provinces and to the United States, North America and the World.

At a mapping centre, place a road map that has been cut into puzzle pieces. Make sure the puzzle pieces have been mounted on a sturdy backing and laminated. Store the pieces in an envelope. Attach an instruction card. The students will assemble the pieces to make a map of Manitoba.

Laminate several road maps of Manitoba. Place the maps at the mapping centre. On a chart list the names of various cities, towns, rivers, lakes and tourist attractions that you would like the students to find on the road map. Use bingo chips to mark the places.

At the mapping centre place blank outline maps of Manitoba. The students could use the maps to locate and mark on various places.



Other maps of Manitoba and atlases should be placed at the centre as well. The centre could be entitled "Let's Explore Manitoba".

Interest Centre:

Label a centre "Let's Look at Manitoba". Encourage your students to bring in articles that pertain to the province.

e.g. books, travel brochures, brochures about tourist attractions, photographs, souvenirs, postcards, buttons, pennants, hats, t-shirts, pins, magazines, plants, artifacts, flags, posters, calendar pictures, books

Discussion Topics

Discuss any of the following topics on Manitoba.

- a) Location and Size
- b) Land Forms Found in the Province
- c) Work of the People and Their Lifestyle
- d) Products Made/Grown in Manitoba
- e) Famous People of Manitoba
- f) Famous Places Found in Manitoba
- g) Famous Bodies of Water
- h) Symbols, Emblems, Flags of Manitoba, Provincial Bird, Provincial Flower
- i) History of the Province
- j) Animals and Plants of Manitoba
- k) The importance of Manitoba

Guest Speakers:

1. Invite a Native person who can relate the lifestyle of the early inhabitants who lived in Manitoba in the past. Perhaps the guest could be of Inuit ancestry and could discuss Inuit art and Inuit customs with your students. A knowledgeable person with North American Native ancestry could discuss the early lifestyle experienced by his/her people and the importance of the buffalo. A métis could perhaps relate the importance of Louis Riel in Canadian history.






