

Robert Kimmel Smith was born in Brooklyn, New York on July 31, 1940, where he still lives with his wife, Claire, a literary agent, and their two grown children, Heidi and Roger. Prior to 1970 he wrote short stories under the pseudonym Peter Marks, and has been a full time free-lance writer since 1980.

Robert Kimmel Smith learned to write when he was a copywriter for an advertising firm, creating ads and commercials. At the age of 40, he decided to become a full time writer and has never regretted his decision. He has written many plays and novels for adults and children, and feels that he's especially talented at writing dialogue. He therefore plans to concentrate on writing plays, film, and television scripts, but says he'll write a novel again if he gets a good idea.

Robert Kimmel Smith treats writing like a job. He works in his office at home from 9:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., five days a week. He says that it takes discipline to write a book and having a deadline is a good idea. Deadlines make him stick to the job and not daydream the day away. He tries to write five good pages each day.

The story "Chocolate Fever" started as a bedtime story for his daughter Heidi. Robert Kimmel Smith had always been a chocolate lover and modeled Henry after himself. Mr. Smith told Heidi about five minutes of the story each night before she went to bed. He finished telling the story after a couple of weeks and Heidi wanted to hear it again. Unfortunately, Mr. Smith had forgotten many of the parts and Heidi had to help him retell the story. She soon convinced him to write the story out and that is how this popular children's novel came to be. "Chocolate Fever" is Robert Kimmel Smith's first book and has sold almost two million copies.

Henry Kimmel Smith has written several books for children including Bobby Baseball, Jelly Belly, Mostly Michael, The Squeaky Wheel and The War with Grandpa. Smith uses incidents from his own life or things that happened to
