



#### **Gros Morne National Park**

#### A Newfoundland and Labrador Landmark



Gros Morne National Park is located on the western shore of the Great Northern Peninsula of Newfoundland. The park is 1 805 sq kilometres in size, the largest national park in Atlantic Canada, and contains the most spectacular scenery in Canada's national park system.

The Long Range Mountains rise abruptly from the narrow coastal plain and dominate the park's landscape. At

the top of these mountains is a vast alpine plateau of tundra, bogs and "tuckamoor" (tangled, twisted thickets of stunted spruce and fir trees). Gros Morne is one of the few places in the world where rocks from the earth's mantle and oceanic crust are exposed, providing an outstanding example of major stages in the earth's evolutionary history. This orange-brown rock is 500 million years old and is a huge slab of oceanic crust and underlying mantle rock that was forced to the surface when the continents of Africa and North America collided.


The coastal lowlands have large, raised bogs dotted with pitcher plants. The Gulf of St. Lawrence shoreline is very picturesque with rocky capes and peninsulas jutting into the ocean and broad, sandy beaches. The towering cliffs of freshwater fiords carved by glaciers are spectacular land forms. Other important water bodies in the park are Western Brook Pond, Trout River Pond, Ten Mile Pond, Bonne Bay, St. Paul's Inlet, Lomond River and Bakers Brook Falls.

There are over 40 sites rich in ancient fossils such as trilobites and exposed rock strata in Gros Morne National Park. Two distinct ecoregions are found in the park. They are the coastal lowlands along the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the alpine plateau of the Long Range Mountains. These areas are home to moose, red foxes, black bears, snowshoe hares, herds of woodland caribou, ptarmigans, bald eagles and ospreys. Harbour seals breed on small islands off the coast and whales can be seen migrating.

Tourists from all over the world come to the Gros Morne National Park to hike the various trails, view the beautiful scenery, observe the wildlife, look at some of the oldest rock found in the world or to hunt for fossils and watch the 10 000 year old icebergs floating in the ocean.

#### **Green Gables**

#### A Prince Edward Island Landmark



Green Gables is the home that Lucy Maud Montgomery used as the setting for her well known novel - "Anne of Green Gables". The house and farm is located in Prince Edward Island National Park close to the town of Cavendish. It was built in the mid-1800's and was owned by David and Margaret MacNeill, who were cousins of Lucy Maud Montgomery's grandfather.


Green Gables is the home in which the characters Marilla and Mathew Cuthbert and Anne Shirley lived. In 1937, the farmland was preserved by

the Federal Government within Prince Edward Island National Park. The famous green and white victorian house has been restored and furnished the way it would have been in Anne's day. In Anne's room, there are artifacts from the story, including a slate like the one Anne used to crack over Gilbert Blyth's head. This house is a living monument to the Anne of Green Gables book.

At the Green Gables site, period farm outbuildings have been restored such as a barn, granary, and woodshed. The famous trails are well signed and those who walk them will surely hear echoes of Anne Shirley's voice.

Although Lucy Maud Montgomery never lived at Green Gables, she lived nearby with her grandparents. She explored the farm and surrounding woodlands and knew them well. She discovered places and gave them names such as "Lover's Lane", "Haunted Woods", and "Balsam Hollow".

Every summer, thousands of tourists from all over the world stroll through the humble green and white frame house and follow the trails through the shady forest while listening to the babbling brook of Lucy Maud Montgomery's childhood.
