Lesson 2: Asking for Help

Skills

- A. Try on your own first.
- B. Decide what help you need.
- C. Raise your hand.
- D. Ask politely.

Materials

Picture Book: pages 78 through 85

Introduction

Some students miss learning opportunities because they're afraid asking for help will make them look stupid.

Other students might not request help in an appropriate tone of voice. They may demand rather than ask. People don't appreciate demands. Teachers respond more willingly to pleasant requests.

It's important for your students to learn to ask questions to interact appropriately with their teachers in the classroom. Students who can ask for help appropriately are seen as responsible learners.

Goals

In this lesson, your students will increase their classroom responsibility by learning when and how to ask for help. The activities will teach your students to

- try to find the answer by themselves first
- be specific when asking for help
- raise their hands and wait patiently until someone can help
- ask in a friendly tone of voice
- learn to ask the right person for help at the right time
- listen when help is given
- say thank you

Preparation

Talk to your students about the importance of asking for help if they need it. Fill a bag so full of books that you have to carry it in both hands. Carry the filled bag and walk to the closed classroom door and try to open it. Show your students that you're having trouble opening the door and ask one of them for help. Then, talk to your students about what could have happened if you hadn't asked for help.

Social Skills Story

Use page 78 in the Picture Book for this story. Ask, "Can you think of a time when you didn't ask for help when you should have? Tell about it. One day, Jonathan asked for help. But he didn't ask politely. Listen to this story."
