What Is Interpersonal Negotiation? =

Interpersonal negotiation means that people talk about a problem. They try to think of a compromise that satisfies everyone.

Negotiation works well when people want something they can't divide, like a movie ticket. It also works well when friends have different ideas about what to do together.

Negotiation doesn't work well when someone has more power or authority than you. It also doesn't work when someone threatens you.



Reaching a Compromise **1**

Sometimes a compromise is the best way to settle a disagreement. Both partners talk together and each give up something to make a deal that satisfies both of them. Here's an example:



Naomi wears trendy clothes and is proud of the tattoos on her arms. Her mom is embarrassed about the way Naomi looks, especially in front of Grandma. Grandma is coming to visit next weekend. Naomi's mom asks her to dress more traditionally and to cover her tattoos while Grandma is there. Naomi thinks it shouldn't make any difference what she wears, especially at home.

Here is one way they could compromise to settle this disagreement:

• Naomi can wear whatever she likes, as long as she keeps her tattoos covered.
