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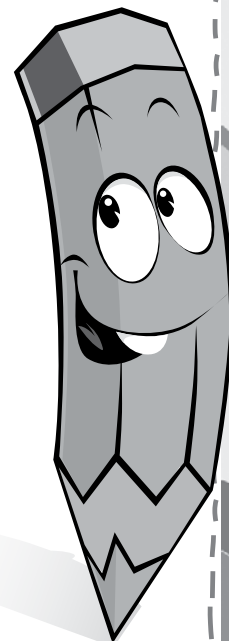
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How to Use This Book (cont.)

Practicing cursive

Once students have learned how to write letters and letter combinations in cursive, have them complete the themed activity sheets (pages 45–74). In each section, all of the pages lead up to the final page where students create a real-life connection piece. (Answer keys for the appropriate pages can be found in Appendix A.) Each theme includes the following pages:

Introduction

Allows students to read a brief introductory text (in cursive) about each theme. Students read the information and then answer questions in cursive writing.

Graphic Organizer

Students continue practicing their cursive by writing words and sentences that are associated with each theme.

Puzzle

To make learning even more enjoyable, students complete a puzzle associated with each theme.

Artwork

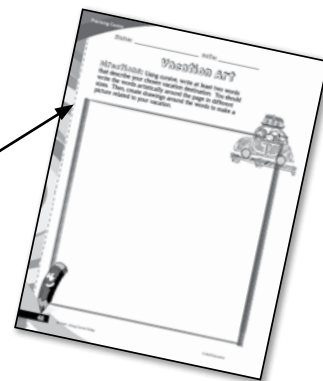
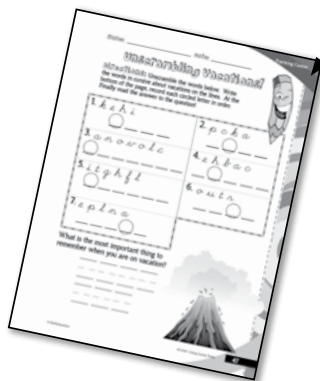
Students use creative thinking skills to bring cursive writing and art together when creating masterpieces.

Reading

This provides opportunities for students to interact with cursive in real-world situations. After reading information related to the theme, students answer text-dependent questions.

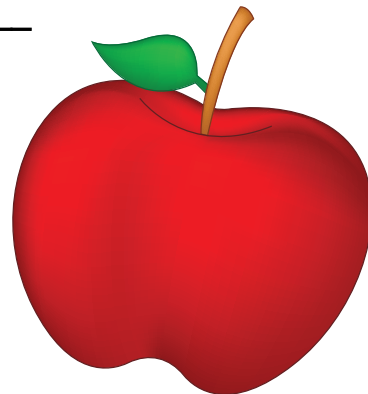
Real-World Connection
