Clinician’s note: The child may need to occlude her nose to produce the sound correctly when she is first learning. If the child has difficulty, she can also use the /h/ sound as a facilitator. Have the child begin producing the /h/ sound and then open and close her lips, resulting in “ha**PhaPhaP**.”
