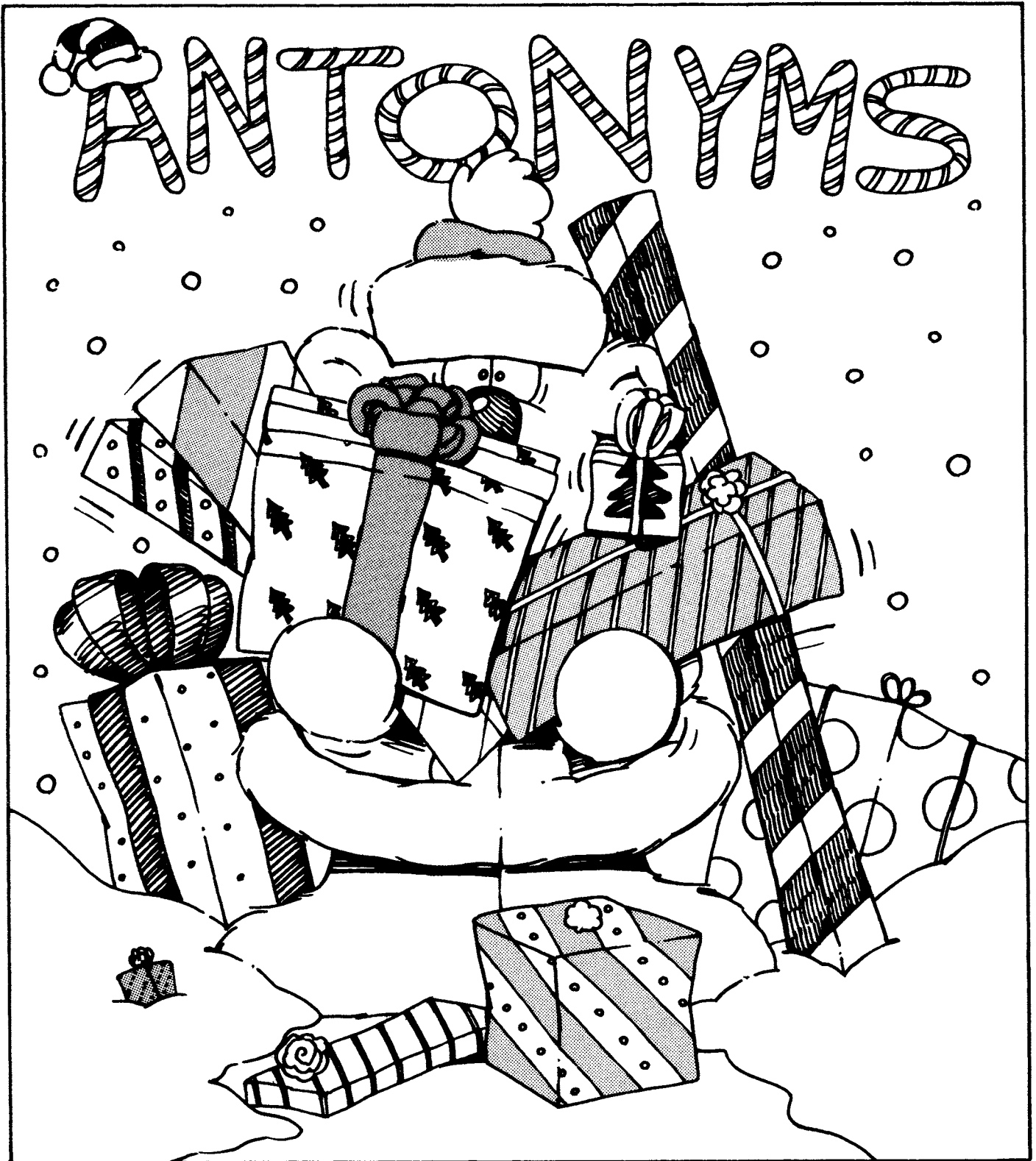




**Class Goal:** Your students will be able to name the group to which two or more words belong.

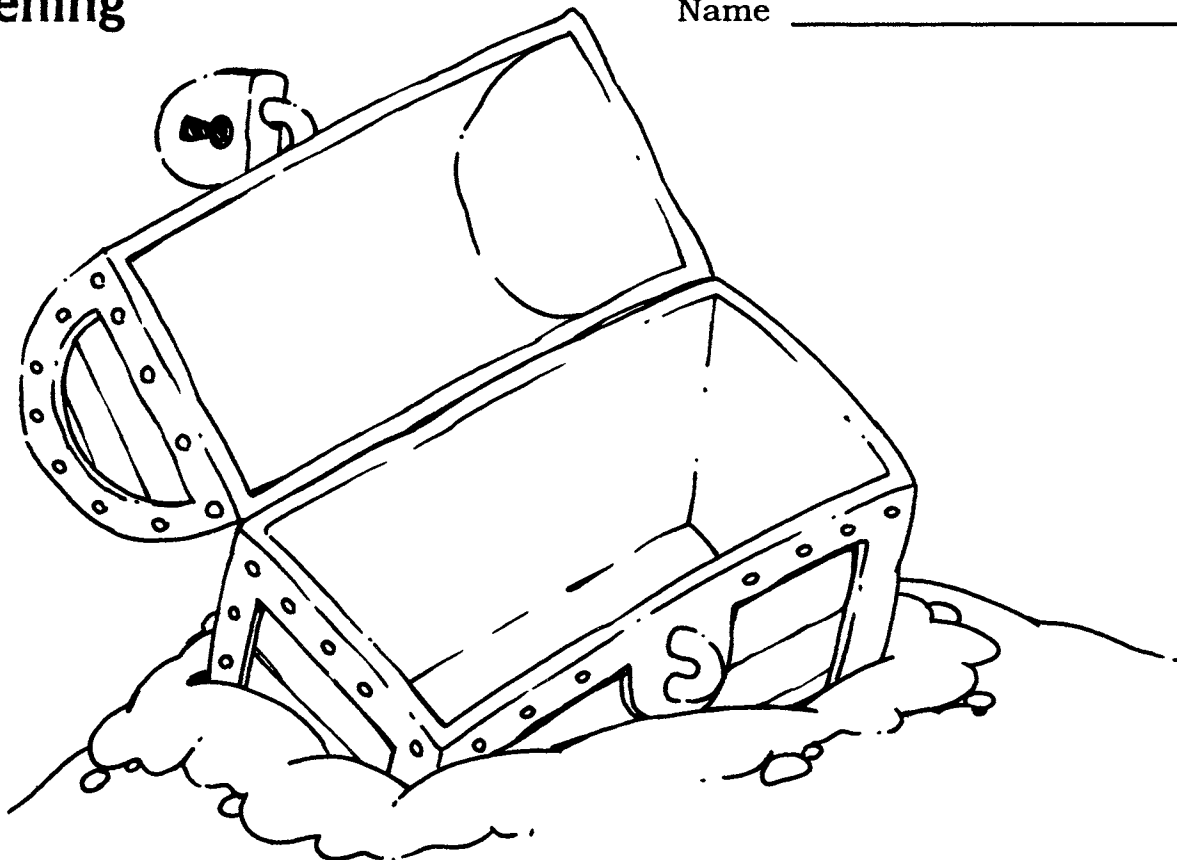
**Listening:** Listen carefully while I read you some sentences. Tell me which word in each sentence has more than one meaning. Next, tell me another meaning for the word. When you tell a meaning, draw a coin in the treasure chest

1. I'm mailing a *letter* to my grandma.     *Letter also means part of the alphabet.*
2. My dog has a loud *bark*.     *Bark also means the outside covering of trees and branches.*
3. *Duck* or you'll be hit by the ball!     *Duck also means a bird with webbed feet.*
4. She stood in the *back* of the bus.     *Back also means a part of the body.*

# Home Lesson

Dear \_\_\_\_\_,

It's been a "red letter" month as we talked about *idioms*. Idioms are phrases that don't really mean what they say. For example, "cracking up" doesn't really mean your face is cracking. It just means you think something is really funny. You can help your child learn more about idioms by practicing this listening activity.

Thanks for your help! "Have a blast!"

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**Listening:** (Your child will need crayons to do the activity.)

1. Look at sun one. If "won by a nose" means someone got a prize because his nose won a race, color Brennan's nose purple. Tell what the idiom really means. (*barely won a race*) Now, color Brennan's nose red.
2. Look at sun two. If "stop bugging me" means to leave me alone, color the bug brown.
3. Look at sun three. If "butterflies in your stomach" means you just swallowed some butterflies, draw an X on each butterfly. Tell what the idiom really means. (*You're nervous.*) Now, color the butterflies.
